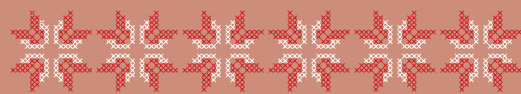

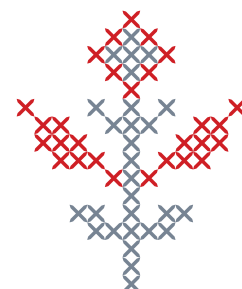

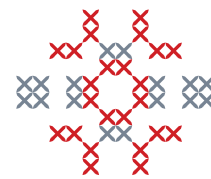

Questions

of the Congress LIDC Bucharest 2026

Every year, the LIDC organises an international Congress dedicated to the in-depth examination of two specific issues within this field of law. National Groups or individual members prepare national reports on each topic, which serve as the foundation for a comprehensive international report discussed during the Congress. All reports are published by Springer and LIDC in the series "LIDC Contributions on Antitrust Law, Intellectual Property and Unfair Competition."

We are pleased to announce that the two study questions prepared by the rapporteurs and discussed at the Bucharest Congress are as follows:



Question A

To what extent and in what way have the negotiated procedures (leniency, commitments, settlements and, where applicable, consent decrees) improved the effectiveness of Antitrust Law without unduly conflicting with fundamental principles such as the rights of defense and confidentiality?

Background & Context

Procedures for the public enforcement of antitrust rules are long and very resource intensive. This is because their very ambitious public policy objectives are only matched by the seriousness of their consequences. Moreover, the procedures regularly involve collecting and carefully scrutinizing a huge amount of evidence which needs to then be analyzed through a variety of economic and legal lenses in order to check whether it supports one of the many theories of harm antitrust law is now concerned with.

In this context, negotiated procedures, which result in a quicker restoration of the competitive landscape but under terms which are acceptable to both the competition authorities and the undertakings under investigation, which benefit consumers and also allow for the limited public resources to last for even more antitrust enforcement procedures, appear as very important policy tools. This was, in general, also proven in practice by their wide adoption, once enacted.

A variety of negotiated procedures was gradually made available for the goal of balancing different incentives and objectives: assistance in the detection of antitrust infringements and the gathering of evidence (e.g. leniency), the faster restoration of the competitive landscape (e.g.

commitments), the faster resolution of the case and avoiding prolonged annulment litigation (e.g. settlements), or some part of each of these (consent decrees).

However, negotiated procedures, being concluded between the competition authority and the undertakings under investigation, do not generally include a full and exhaustive analysis of the facts and legal arguments pertaining to the infringement and, in some cases, are not subject to review by the courts. Therefore questions arise regarding whether the effectiveness of this type of procedure is up to the standard of effectiveness of antitrust law and how is the public interest served by such procedure being concluded instead of a full investigation being conducted.

Moreover, not only the rights and interests of the general public need to be addressed, but also the rights and interests of the investigated undertakings and of the other persons impacted by the investigation (e.g. author of the complaint, possible claimants of private damages etc.). The need to protect the fundamental rights and principles of all these various parties must be weaved into how these procedures are designed, how they differ from each other and into how they can be used.





Question B

To what extent does intellectual property law recognize the evolving concept of “art,” including in the context of AI-assisted creation, and how does this shape the limits between the different types of Intellectual Property Rights and their role in enabling innovation, investment and the monetization of creative outputs?

Background & Context

Next year marks one hundred years since Constantin Brâncuși cast one of his Bird in Space statues, a work that traveled to the United States and prompted the courts to ask: “What is art in the eyes of the law?”

In the century since, both art and our understanding of it have transformed dramatically. Artistic expression has taken countless forms, propelled by technological developments, and is now consumed—and monetized—in ways far removed from those imaginable when the Bird in Space case was argued.

As intellectual property law remains the primary framework for protecting and monetizing artistic expression, it is imperative that it evolves in step with contemporary conceptions of art. IP law must ensure that its incentive producing mechanisms are properly aligned with new

dimensions of artistic creation and the technological means of making, disseminating, and consuming art.

At its most ambitious reading, the question seeks to explore how “art” is understood within the protected domain of intellectual property law—whether under creative, utilitarian, or distinctive regimes of protection—the boundaries of that understanding (for example, whether the law should operate with closed or open lists of protected subject matter and where those boundaries should be drawn), and how the relationship between art and the technological means of its production should be defined, particularly in the context of AI assisted creation. Ultimately, it asks how these evolving dynamics will affect artists, businesses, and society at large in terms of fostering innovation, attracting investment, and generating value.

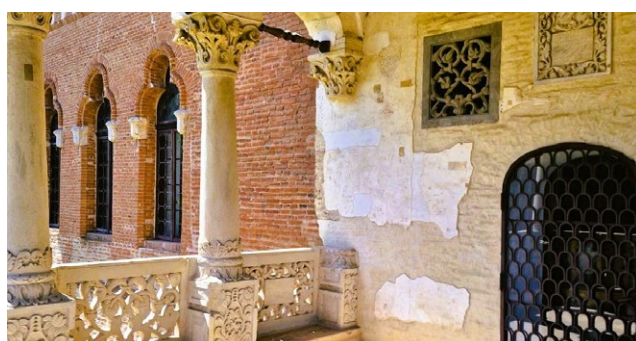
Mogoșoaia Palace – Sunday Cultural Visit ❖❖❖

On Sunday morning, participants will have the opportunity to join a guided visit to Mogoșoaia Palace, one of the most beautiful and historically significant cultural monuments near Bucharest.

Located approximately 15 kilometres from the city centre, the palace was built between 1698 and 1702 by Prince Constantin Brâncoveanu and represents one of the finest examples of Brâncovenesc architecture – a distinctive Romanian architectural style that harmoniously combines Byzantine, Ottoman, Renaissance and Baroque influences.

Set on the shores of Lake Mogoșoaia and surrounded by extensive gardens and parkland, the palace offers an atmosphere of serenity and elegance. Its open loggias, stone arcades, intricate carvings and balanced proportions reflect the artistic sophistication of the Brâncovenesc period, which remains one of the defining expressions of Romanian cultural heritage.

Throughout the centuries, Mogoșoaia Palace has served as a royal residence, cultural retreat and meeting place for intellectual and artistic circles. Today, it functions as an important cultural and historical site, hosting exhibitions,



artistic events and educational programmes dedicated to preserving Romanian heritage.

The Sunday excursion will provide participants with an opportunity to discover a different dimension of Romanian history and architecture beyond the urban landscape of Bucharest. The visit will include a guided tour of the palace and its grounds.

Together, these events aim to complement the academic programme of the Congress by creating opportunities for dialogue, cultural discovery and international exchange in some of Romania’s most distinctive and memorable locations.

About the accompanying persons programme

In parallel with the scientific sessions of the Congress, a special accompanying persons programme will offer guests the opportunity to discover Bucharest through two carefully curated guided tours dedicated to the city's history, architecture, cultural life and distinctive atmosphere. Designed as relaxed explorations of the Romanian capital, the tours combine historical landmarks, cultural institutions and local experiences, allowing participants to discover both the monumental and intimate dimensions of Bucharest.

Friday, 16 October 2026

“Bucharest Between History, Finance and Modern Art”

The Friday programme will explore the historical centre of Bucharest and some of its most emblematic institutional and architectural landmarks, revealing the city's transformation from a late nineteenth-century commercial capital into a vibrant contemporary cultural destination.

The tour will begin with a visit to the National Bank of Romania (BNR), one of the country's most important institutional buildings and a symbol of Romania's modern economic development. Built in a monumental neoclassical style, the BNR Palace reflects the ambitions of Romania during the Belle Époque period, when Bucharest became known as the “Little Paris of the East.” Located in the historic Lipscani district, the building remains one of the city's architectural landmarks and an important witness to Romania's political and financial history.

The route will continue through the old commercial quarter towards Stavropoleos Monastery, one of the most charming and refined religious monuments in Bucharest. Built in the early eighteenth century in the Brâncovenesc style, the monastery is renowned for its elegant stone carvings, delicate arches and peaceful courtyard hidden among the lively streets of the Old Town. Despite the constant transformation of the surrounding city, Stavropoleos has preserved an atmosphere of tranquillity and historical continuity that makes it one of Bucharest's most beloved cultural landmarks.

Nearby, participants will discover the impressive CEC Palace, one of the city's grandest architectural monuments. Inaugurated in 1900 and distinguished by its monumental dome and eclectic French-inspired design, the building reflects the optimism and cosmopolitan spirit of Bucharest at the turn of the twentieth century. Facing the National Museum of Romanian History on Calea Victoriei, the palace remains one of the capital's most recognizable landmarks.

The tour will also include the Telephone Palace, considered one of the first modern skyscrapers in Bucharest. Completed in the 1930s in an Art Deco and early modernist style, the building represented a symbol of technological progress and urban modernity during the interwar period. Its elegant

vertical lines and American-inspired architecture marked a significant moment in the city's architectural evolution.

A central moment of the afternoon will be the visit to Art Safari and its special exhibition dedicated to Constantin Brâncuși, marking 150 years since the birth of Romania's most internationally celebrated artist. Brâncuși fundamentally transformed modern sculpture through his radical simplicity of form and his search for the essence of movement, space and materiality. The exhibition offers participants an opportunity to engage with the artistic legacy of a figure whose work continues to influence contemporary understandings of art, originality and creativity — themes closely connected to the broader discussions of the Congress itself.

The programme will conclude with a relaxing stop at one of the elegant cafés located in the historic centre, offering participants the opportunity to enjoy Bucharest's vibrant café culture while continuing conversations in an informal setting.

“Dorobanți, Elegant Bucharest and the Spirit of Calea Victoriei”

The Saturday programme will focus on a different side of Bucharest — the refined residential areas, quiet architectural streets and cultural atmosphere that continue to define the city’s distinctive charm.

The tour will begin in the Dorobanți district, one of Bucharest’s most elegant neighbourhoods, known for its tree-lined streets, early twentieth-century villas and refined urban atmosphere. Developed primarily during the interwar period, the area reflects the cosmopolitan aspirations of Bucharest’s intellectual, diplomatic and political elites. Walking through its narrow and peaceful streets, participants will discover an architectural landscape where Neo-Romanian, Art Deco, modernist and neoclassical influences coexist harmoniously.

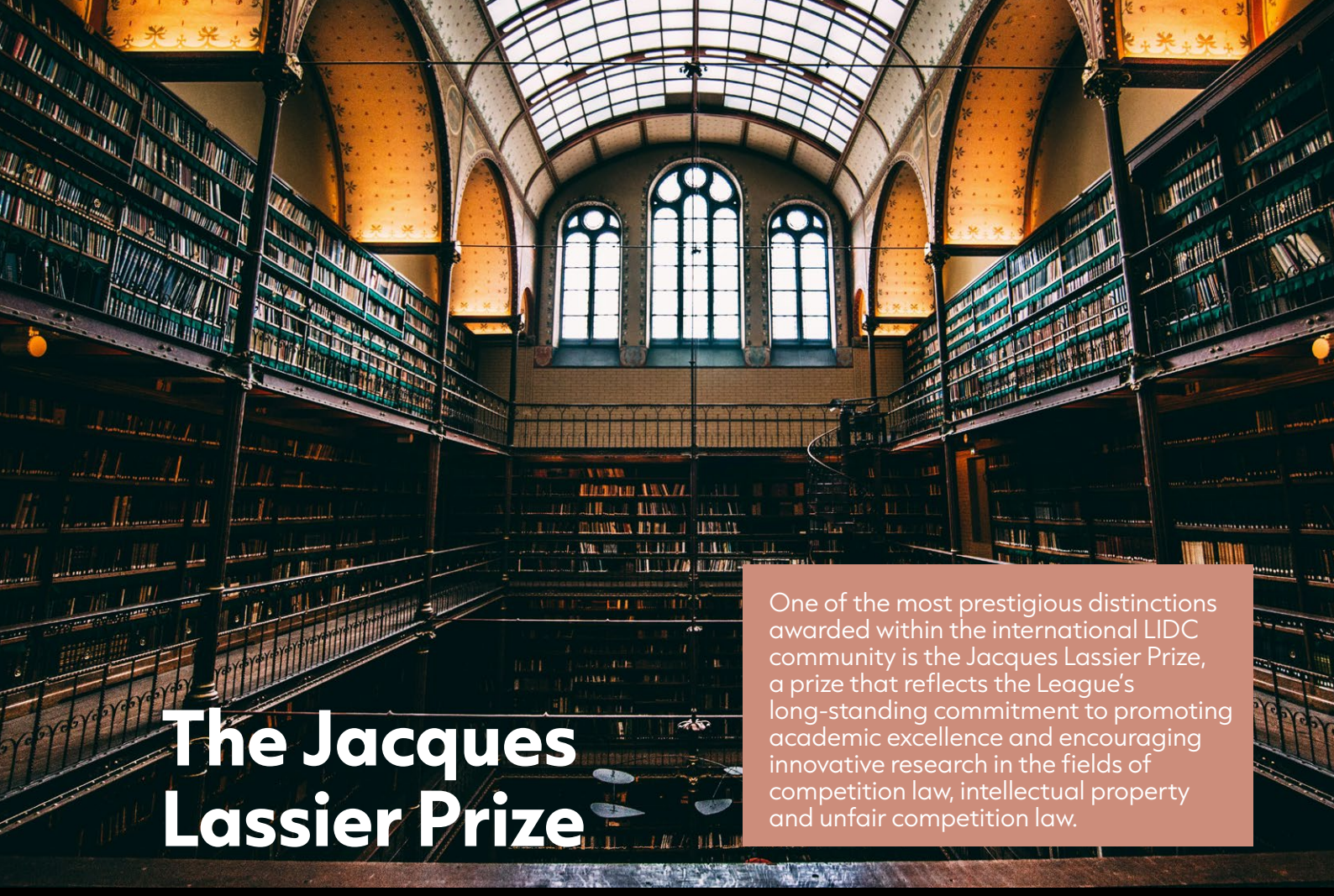
A highlight of the tour will be the Zambaccian Museum, one of Romania’s most important small art museums and a hidden cultural gem of Bucharest. Housed in the former residence of art collector Krikor H. Zambaccian, the museum contains remarkable works by Romanian masters including Nicolae Grigorescu, Ștefan Luchian and Theodor Pallady, alongside works by European artists. The intimate scale of the museum and the elegance of the residence itself offer a unique insight into Bucharest’s interwar cultural sophistication.

The walk will continue through the elegant residential streets surrounding Dorobanți and Primăverii, areas that preserve much of Bucharest’s historic urban fabric despite the transformations of recent decades. Participants will discover discreet villas, diplomatic residences and architectural details that reveal the city’s layered history and complex identity.

The programme will also include a coffee break in the area of the Government. Beyond its official character, the district is also appreciated for its quiet cafés, green avenues and relaxed atmosphere.

The tour will conclude with a walk along Calea Victoriei, Bucharest’s most famous boulevard and one of the city’s great symbolic arteries. Originally developed as a princely road linking the old royal court to the north of the city, Calea Victoriei gradually became the social, political and cultural centre of Bucharest. Lined with grand hotels, palaces, theatres, libraries and historic residences, the avenue still preserves fragments of the elegance that once earned Bucharest its reputation as the “Little Paris.” Today, it remains one of the city’s most vibrant and atmospheric spaces, where history and contemporary urban life continue to intersect.





The Jacques Lassier Prize

One of the most prestigious distinctions awarded within the international LIDC community is the Jacques Lassier Prize, a prize that reflects the League's long-standing commitment to promoting academic excellence and encouraging innovative research in the fields of competition law, intellectual property and unfair competition law.

Established in memory of Jacques Lassier, a distinguished French lawyer and former Chairman of the International League of Competition Law (LIDC), the prize was created to honour his contribution to the development of legal scholarship and international cooperation in these areas of law. Through this award, the LIDC seeks to encourage young academics and researchers to pursue ambitious and original work capable of advancing legal thinking and contributing to the evolution of competition and intellectual property law worldwide.

Awarded every two years, the Jacques Lassier Prize recognizes an outstanding doctoral dissertation devoted to competition law in its broadest sense, including antitrust law, unfair competition law, unfair commercial practices and intellectual property law. The competition is open to candidates from countries represented within the LIDC, and submissions are evaluated by an international jury composed of leading academics and practitioners from different jurisdictions.

What makes the Jacques Lassier Prize particularly significant is its focus on original academic research. At a time when competition law and intellectual property law are increasingly confronted with complex challenges arising from digitalization, artificial intelligence, global markets and rapidly evolving business models, rigorous scholarly analysis plays a vital role in shaping future legal frameworks. The Prize therefore serves not only as a recognition of academic achievement but also as a platform for identifying ideas and research that may influence legal practice, policy-making and judicial reasoning for years to come.

Over the years, the Prize has highlighted exceptional work produced by emerging scholars from different legal traditions and jurisdictions. Many former recipients have gone on to become respected academics, practitioners, judges, competition officials or policy-makers, contributing significantly to the development of competition and intellectual property law at both national and international levels.

The most recent recipient of the Jacques Lassier Prize is Niccolò Galli, who received the award in 2024 for his dissertation "Patent Aggregation, Innovation and EU Competition Law." His research explored the increasingly important relationship between patent aggregation practices, innovation incentives and European competition law, addressing issues that are highly relevant in today's technology-driven economy. The award once again demonstrated the Prize's ability to identify research that combines academic excellence with practical relevance for businesses, regulators and legal practitioners.

The 2026 edition of the Jacques Lassier Prize will continue this tradition of excellence. The winner will be announced and honoured during the LIDC Congress in Bucharest, providing an opportunity to showcase outstanding scholarship before an international audience of academics, judges, competition authorities, in-house counsel and practitioners.

The 2026 Jacques Lassier Prize is evaluated by an outstanding international jury composed of leading academics and practitioners from across Europe, reflecting the Prize's reputation as one of the most prestigious distinctions in the





fields of competition and intellectual property law. The jury is chaired by Professor Jules Stuyck (KU Leuven and Crowell & Moring, Brussels) and brings together distinguished experts including Muriel Chagny (Université Paris-Saclay), Godefroy de Boiscuillé (Université Côte d'Azur and Université Paris Panthéon-Assas), Pranvera Këllezi (Geneva Bar and Swiss Federal Competition Commission), Radka MacGregor Pelikanova (Metropolitan University Prague and University of New York in Prague), Julia Suderow (Universidad de Deusto and Suderow Fernandez Abogadas), and Professor Răzvan Dincă, Dean of the Faculty of Law of the University

of Bucharest. Their combined expertise spans academia, private practice, arbitration, competition enforcement and intellectual property, ensuring a rigorous and internationally recognized evaluation process.

By celebrating intellectual curiosity, rigorous analysis and innovative legal thinking, the Jacques Lassier Prize remains one of the most respected academic distinctions in the LIDC community and an enduring tribute to the values of scholarship, international dialogue and legal excellence that have shaped the organisation since its foundation.

The LIDC's objectives are:

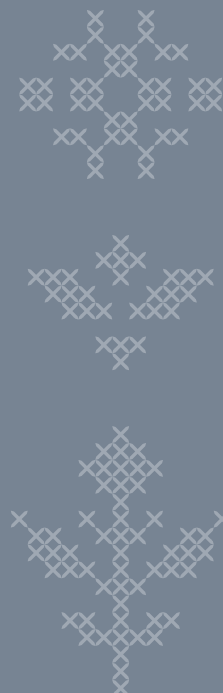
- to promote the principles of fairness and justice in competitive trade;
